## LATE AUTUMN 2022 NEWSLETTER

Much of this newsletter will be devoted to describing recent exciting news from the Alalay Foundation. Earlier in October, thanks to other major donors, a 10-strong all-girls' football team from Alalay travelled from Bolivia to Doha to participate in the <u>Street Child Football World Cup</u> <u>2022</u>. The girls played against teams of street-connected children from 24 other countries, and we are very proud to announce that overall they finished in fourth place. Alongside this international football tournament, the trip included an International Congress to champion the rights of street-connected children worldwide. The delegation was joined by Bolivian politicians and the media.

The girls' team presented their hopes for the future to the attending President of the Bolivian Senate, through a country-specific advocacy plan they had developed, involving four key pillars:

- a life free of violence within the family, school and community;
- access to quality education, incorporating relevant technologies;
- the need for a state proposal for children and young people which prioritises programmes for the most vulnerable groups;
- for all children to have free-of-charge access to their birth certificates, especially those who live/work on the streets, or in some form of centre away from their families (such as Alalay) and/or are in a situation of vulnerability or social exclusion.

The team explained that this last point is the "door through which other rights can also be achieved, such as the right to education, work and health".

In addition, the team participated in a Festival of Arts, and demonstrated their painting and dancing talents – showing a traditional Tinku dance to the other teams and attendees. It was clearly such a fantastic trip and the team have returned to Bolivia filled with energy and passion to change the World for the better (once they've got over their jetlag)! Once again the event aims to use sport as a platform for positive change. Unfortunately, Bolivia does not have much of a history of cricket, so the team will definitely need some serious training beforehand. Please do <u>get in touch</u> if you have any useful contacts or innovative suggestions from the cricketing world – for example, help ranging from providing kit and equipment to coaching is needed.


